Croatia 1 – 1 Brazil AET (P 4 – 2)

The first quarter-final saw a shock exit for the tournament favourites Brazil who were dumped out of the competition on penalties (4-2) against Croatia after their quarter-final clash ended 1-1. The Selecao's European World Cup curse continues – since winning the tournament in 2002, they've lost all six knockout stage encounters against European sides. A brilliant goal by Neymar in the 106th minute looked to be sending Brazil through to the semi-final, only for Croatia to level in the 117th minute via Bruno Petkovic who scored with Croatia's only shot on target in the match. In the shoot-out, Croatian keeper Dominik Livakovic saved Rodrygo's spot-kick before Marquinhos' penalty hit the post to send the Brazilian's crashing out of the tournament and Croatia through to their second consecutive World Cup semi-final.

Netherlands 2 – 2 Argentina AET (P 3 – 4)

In what turned out to be the most carded match in World Cup history (15 players), Argentina managed to sneak through against the Netherlands on penalties despite their own best efforts, having surrendered a 2-0 lead late in the second half. Lionel Messi proved to be the difference maker up until that point, setting up Molina's first-half goal with a needled through ball, then doubling Argentina's with a 73rd minute penalty. 83rd and 101st minute goals from Netherlands substitute Wout Weghorst, who is likely the only player in history to score 2 world-cup quarter final goals despite not being good enough to play for Burnley, took the game into extra-time and then penalties. Two brilliant Emi Martinez penalty saves ensured the South American side progressed through to the next round, setting up a Croatia – Argentina semi-final.

Morocco 1 – 0 Portugal

Morocco made history by becoming the first African side in history to reach a World Cup semifinal. A 42nd minute opener from Youseff En-Nesyri turned out to be the decider, as a Moroccan masterclass in defending ensured the European side were unable to find the back of the net. While it was all celebrations for the African side, Ronaldo's World Cup fairy-tale couldn't have ended much worse – eliminated by the lowest ranked team in the competition, on the bench for the majority of his final two games, with the globe's final World Cup memory of the great Cristiano Ronaldo being him walking down the tunnel with tears streaming down his face. Brutal.

England 1 – 2 France

The long wait for football to come home continues as England, despite playing the best football they've played all tournament, were unable to overcome the 12-men French team (11 if we're not including the referee). France took the lead early in the first half courtesy of a long-range strike from Tchouameni, a goal which arguably shouldn't have stood due to the foul on Bukayo Saka at the other end of the pitch. A 54th minute Harry Kane penalty levelled the game before a close-range Olivier Giroud header in the 78th minute restored the French lead. A foul on Mason Mount in the 82nd penalty awarded England a penalty, a chance to level the game. The stage was set for captain Harry Kane, England's best penalty taker, with the opportunity to not only overtake Wayne Rooney as England's all-time leading goal-scorer, but to give England the chance to progress through to the World Cup semi-final. He steps up, places the ball down, steps back, and he sends the ball out of the roof of the stadium, crushing the dreams of England fans and players alike, and the French go through. Morroco – France semi-final. Hooray.







Counting cards

Before the turn of the century, the highest number of cards dealt during a World Cup clash was a poultry nine, just half of what were shown in Friday evenings quarter final. In the last two decades however, referees have become seemingly keen to caution and dismiss both players and coaching staff with the Dutch also involved in a couple of other booking frenzies, firstly versus Portugal back in 2006 but again four years later in the World Cup final against Spain, on both occasions ending up on the losing side.

Results

Matthew Allen still out in front with four fixtures left in the tournment, the six players behind him also matching th leader in terms of points over the quarter finals.

90 players still have at least 1 team left in the competition (unlucky **James Milligan**, **Charlotte White**, **Toni Johnson** and **Andy Wyatt**) but no one managed to pick more than two sides to make the last four.

With most backed Brazil now out of the competition, will we see some some last minute movements in the table?
